From the Principal

MacKillop Catholic College External Validation 2015

Dear Parents and Community Members,

This year MacKillop Catholic College will review our progress towards our strategic goals for the College through a validation process. We have much to celebrate in our journey as a new Catholic school community, and it is timely to review our progress to date, with the intent to inform our future planning.

An External Validation Team will work with College Leadership as part of Catholic Education NT's cycle of improvement, the School Improvement and Renewal Framework (SIRF). The validation team will report to the College and Catholic Education Office on our successes and challenges in each of the six areas of the SIRF during these initial years of our College, and make recommendations for the future.

To provide context for the External Validation Team the College will assemble data including a self-assessment in each of the six SIRF areas, which will be led by our College Leadership Team. The External Validation Team will review achievement data from the range of sources, and through interviews with our college community and key partners. They will invite responses to key questions about our College. The Team will also take the opportunity to meet with College Leadership Team, staff, students, parents and community, and will be visiting the College on Friday 11th September.

The Team will compile a report that:

- outlines the College's significant achievements, outcomes and celebrations
- may make explicit recommendations regarding areas for improvement or further development.

The validation process will affirm school successes and provide a foundation for further growth. I thank you in anticipation for your engagement with the College's External Validation.

From the Deputy Principal: Pastoral Care



The issue of Cyber Safety will be tackled throughout this term in our Pastoral Lessons.

Recently you may have seen programs on television that suggest a growing level of addiction to technology in its various forms, but the aspect that causes most grief in the educational setting is Social Media. As schools come to grips with the ubiquitous nature of mobile technology there is a growing powerlessness around our ability to have any real control over this social media element.



The education provided attempts to enable responsible and respectful use, however we do end up dealing with some of the fallout of misuse of social media applications.

In recognition of the potential for harm through misuse, the Australian government has introduced a newly formed Office of the Children's eSafety Commissioner under the Enhancing Online Safety for Children Act 2015.

The act allows children suffering from serious cyberbullying to contact the Office of the Children's eSafety Commissioner to have content removed if social media companies do not remove the offending content after it has been reported to them.

The Office provides a range of resources to support schools, parents and children in cyberbullying at their website www.esafety.gov.au.

The 'In Class, On Time, On Task' mantra and procedures continue to be shared with staff and students.

One of the significant changes accompanying these procedures will be changes to the timing of the beginning of the school day.

Beginning next Monday, August 17 the bell to require students and teachers to move to HomeForm will ring at 8.25am, not 8.15am. Homeform will commence at 8.30am sharp. This extra 10 minutes of time outside of the classroom per day is an offering to ensure that students then make the effort to be 'On Time' to not only Homeform, but also to all of their other classes throughout the school day.

These changes to the beginning of the day will have no impact on the times at the end of the school day.

Early Bus Travellers to Humpty Doo will be required to show Period 7 teachers their Early Bus Passes to be released to catch this bus. Mrs Wallis and I will meet with all early bus travellers this week to issue these passes to students whose parents have been contacted around their travel on this bus.

If a student is an irregular traveller on this early bus, they will require a note from parents on those odd occasions they will be required to be released at 2.40pm to catch this bus.

Year 7s spent the day at the Jingili Water Gardens, observing human usage of the site, identifying different stages of the water cycle, and pondering the human impact on nature. Just over the bridge at the mouth of Rapid Creek our Year 8s explored erosion and various coastal landforms. They wandered the beach to Dripstone Cliffs and were able to time wave velocity and hypothesise how wave direction and speed impacted upon coastal erosion. Year 8 Sose Leader Rachel Griffin is to be commended for her efforts on this day, as well as staff and parents who supported the excursion.

And finally, the Year 10s enjoyed a day at the Darwin City Waterfront observing the urbanisation of a natural environment. They engaged with the history and culture of the Waterfront, as well as critically questioning its environmental and economic impact beyond tourism. Year 10 Sose Leader Michael Kingston is to be commended for his efforts on this day, as well as staff and parents who supported the excursion.

Getting Your Head around SACE

One of the hardest things for parents and students is getting their head around all the requirements for SACE. How can I make sure I get my NTCET? What do I need to do to get an ATAR? These can be really hard to get right if you aren't familiar with how SACE works. This week our focus is on Compulsory SACE assessment.

Compulsory SACE Assessment Requirements: Stage 1 School Assessment

SACE subjects are 100% school assessed at Stage 1. School assessments are 'assessments that are set by the school, in accordance with subject outlines, and carried out by the school.' (www.sace.sa.edu.au) At Stage 1 assessments are internally graded; however, compulsory subjects (English, Mathematics and PLP) have confirming moderation processes which are carried out each semester.

Compulsory Subjects

At Stage 1, English, Mathematics, and the Personal Learning Plan (PLP) are compulsory. This means that students must receive a minimum grade of C in order to pass these subjects and graduate with their NTCET. If students do not receive a minimum of C then they are required to repeat the subject until they are able to reach the minimum standard if they fail to do this they will not complete their NTCET successfully.

- Personal Learning Plan (PLP): Students MUST complete 1 semester of PLP in year 10 with a minimum grading of C.
- English: Students MUST complete semester 1 and semester 2 of Stage 1 (year 11) English (any level offered) with a minimum grading of C.
- **Mathematics:** Students MUST complete 1 semester of Stage 1 (year 11) Mathematics (any level offered) with a minimum grading of C.

Moderation

At Stage 1, English, Mathematics, and the Personal Learning Plan (PLP) are moderated. This means that samples of student work are sent to SACE in order to confirm that teachers are marking fairly and grading accurately.

Elective Subjects

At MacKillop Catholic College all other subjects which are not compulsory are classed as electives. Students choose 3 electives from a wide range of subject offerings which include Design and Technology, the Arts, Health and Physical Education, Humanities, Sciences, Languages, Business and Enterprise and cross-disciplinary subjects. It is an expectation that students choose subjects based upon the pre-requisites set for their post-schooling university course or areas of interest. These subjects will gain the students 10 credit points per semester per subject towards their NTCET at Stage 1.

Stage 1 Points

At Stage 1 it is expected that students will attain a minimum of 130 credits towards their NTCET.

Making Wise Choices

It is imperative that students undertaking Stage 1 courses make well planned and wise decisions. Stage 1 subjects undertaken are the pre-requisite study options for Stage 2 subjects. Students studying at Stage 2 are required to have the suitable prior knowledge of the subject at a Stage 1 level.



SATURDAY night's NRL fixture is not the only big ticket footy on in Darwin this weekend.

A group of the Northern Territory's youngest budding rugby league players will represent their state at the 12 years and under School Sport Australia Rugby League Championships.

The NT team will face representative teams from every Australian state, and is particularly wary of the rugby league stronghold states of NSW and Queensland, who have traditionally dominated the under age tournament.

From Darwin, Alice Springs and Katherine, the youngsters will finish an intensive skills training session on Friday before their first game against South Australia on Sunday.

"They are very excited but knackered after today," NT team manager, Alison Sadowski said.

"Because our team is spread out all across the Territory, it's very hard to gel and mould together as a team," she said.

"So it's fine to know how to play but to be able to read your team members and predict what they are going to do is difficult. Because our players are across the Territory, it makes it even harder for us."

The list of big name footy stars to come through the School Sport Australia Championships is extensive, with the likes of Wally Lewis, Darren Lockyer, Mark Gasnier, Paul Harrogan and Mat Rogers all having played as kids. It is the first time School Sport NT has hosted the championships since 2008. On Saturday night, the NT side and their interstate competitors will get the chance to watch and learn from their NRL role models at the Parramatta and Penrith game, and will also have the chance to be down on the field as both teams warm up.
