Dear Members of MacKillop Catholic College Community,

Lent began this Wednesday. Congratulations to our Year 9 Students who wrote and ran the liturgies for the whole college community, and they did an exceptional job. I congratulate them all on their organisation, attention to detail, prayerfulness, and sincere respect for what they were asked to do. Well done Year Nine.

The Season of Lent is a very special time in the Church's year. There are a number of things I ask you to pray for over the period of Lent:

- Peace and unity for the families in our College;
- Unity as a community as we go through rapid change and growth; and
- A renewed understanding of our vision and mission as a Catholic school. I hope that during this Lent we can concentrate on building relationships that are central to our lives. Almost out of habit we think of Lent as a time to "give up something," to do "some penance" and of course self-denial is undoubtedly good for both body and soul. However, Lent can well be a time for very positive action and self-denial can be achieved by the way we express ourselves to other people, and the attention we give to our own self development.

When St Paul was writing to the early Church he encouraged the First Christians to act positively: "...those who give lovingly and freely of themselves and their gifts to others, will discover that there is no end to God's riches. There will be empty spaces now and then when it appears that the springs have dried up. God's grace, however, is eternally sufficient, and He will fill up those places in our lives that were drained dry by our giving to others. And to our surprise we will discover that what we receive from God in response to our giving and sharing with our fellow persons, is far greater than that which we gave away."

Mother Theresa of Calcutta wrote: "Thoughtfulness is the beginning of great sanctity. If you learn this art of being thoughtful, you will become more and more Christ-like, for his heart was meek and he always thought of others. Our life, to be beautiful, must be full of thoughts for others. Jesus went about doing good. Our Lady did nothing else in Cana but thought of the needs of others and made their needs known to Jesus" ... Mother Theresa of Calcutta





BOMBING OF DARWIN EXCURSION

Year 10 History students attended the commemoration for the Bombing of Darwin at the Cenotaph on the 19th of February 2014. The year 10's heard of the heroic acts of the soldiers and civilians who were present on this historic day and watched the reenactment of the Bombing of Darwin which started with the air raid sirens at 9.58am. This indicated the time of the start of the air attacks on Darwin and was followed by the firing of seven rounds by M2A2 Howitzer Guns which signified the Darwin military response.



The year 10's then visited the Darwin Military Museum where they saw first-hand the commemorative wall, the gun placements and military equipment used during World War II, along with the Japanese equipment left behind after the attacks on the Pacific Region. Students commented that one of their favourite museum pieces was the Bombing of Darwin sensory room which featured a cinematic presentation based on one of the attacks on Darwin complete with surround style flashing lights and explosive sounds effects. The year 10 students enjoyed their day and came back to the College with a deep respect not only for the men and women who served during World War II but also for the civilians who found themselves thrust into a terrible war which carried with it a heavy cost in both property and lives.

Year 7 students enjoyed a great day at the Darwin Museum and Art Gallery. Students explored a range of history from ancient to modern. Students explored the Indigenous and Asia-Pacific Region, along with local history such as Cyclone Tracy. The students had a wonderful day exploring artwork, enjoying tactile experiences with millions of years old bones and examining the wonderful and terrifying local history with Cyclone Tracy. A wonderful day was had by all and the students gained a lot of knowledge on the importance of preserving our history.


