Dear Members of the MacKillop Catholic College Community,

Part time jobs can fit into a busy study/school schedule but school/study cannot fit into an almost full time job.

We acknowledge that many students need to find part time jobs to support themselves, supplement family incomes or pay for study expenses. Some studies show students with Part time jobs achieve better grades. Part time jobs can build confidence and competence.

When does a part time job hinder academic achievement? I believe this can be the case when:

- The employer has no understanding of the complex study demands of students today;
- Students repeatedly miss class due to tiredness;
- Students go to work when they should be at school; and,
- Insufficient home study time is left for students to complete their out of school study tasks.

These are just a few.

What does research say:

Rothstein (2007) noted that part-time employment while at school may encourage students to time manage, learn about workplace norms and responsibilities, and be motivated to achieve academic and career goals. On the other hand, the work may be distracting, tiring, and lead to diminished performance at school.

Mortimer, Staff and Oesterle (2003) noted that while much has been written about the negative effects of adolescent part-time employment little attention has been given to the fact that it is through part-time employment that adolescents can "acquire knowledge about the labour force, form occupational values, learn how to behave appropriately in the workplace, and acquire skills that will facilitate their adaptation to work and enhance the likelihood of later success in this domain." Again acknowledging the importance of number of hours in work, advocates maintain "that when youth limit the hours they spend in paid work, they are able to balance their multiple commitments to school, to family, and to their jobs, while at the same time acquiring workplace skills and resources that may help them to make good choices in selecting their future careers" (Staff, Mortimer & Uggen, 2004).

Quirk, Keith and Quirk (2001) raised the question of the relevance of the number of hours of work, and found that student employment contributed to greater academic achievement when it was less than 12 hours per week.

For students in full time study, working impacts on completion- the more hours worked, the greater the effect. Research shows working 16-24hours a week reduces the completion rate by eight percentage points, while more than 24 hours reduces it by 14 percentage points. (Karmel, T NCVER, 2011) What we can take from this is part –time work can be beneficial in many ways as long as the number of hours is realistic. After all, the students already have a full time job, this is called school. Enjoy, debate and review as necessary with your sons and daughters.


40 YEARS OF PRIESTHOOD FOR FATHER TOM

With a pyromaniac named Violet and the enigmatic Hickory by her side, Jane is about to discover that this adventure is even bigger on the inside than it looks ...






In the year 2045, reality is an ugly place. The only time teenage Wade Watts really feels alive is when he's jacked into the virtual





Minister backs school funding plan

AMID a nationwide funding brawl which has left both the Catholic and public systems feeling short-changed, Education Minister Simon Birmingham yesterday broke bread with students and teachers at Palmerston's MacKillop Catholic College. Although a recent Federal Government-commissioned

review found Australian Catholic schools would be worse off under the model announced by Mr Birmingham announced by Mr Birmingnam last year, he yesterday said funding for NT Catholic schools would grow the fastest of any Catholic system in Australia, with a growth rate of 5.8 per cent per student per year. And the Catholics aren't

the only ones crying poor – according to NT Government modelling, the changes would leave public schools \$150 million worse off over 10 years.

During a visit to Clontarf Academy at Sanderson Middle School, Mr Birmingham announced a \$1.5 million increase to the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme

Where is Sri Lanka?


Sri Lanka is an island nation off the southern tip of the Indian subcontinent, just under 6000km from Darwin, less than driving to Adelaide and back.

What is Sri Lanka Known For?

Sri Lanka, formerly known as Ceylon, has a rich cultural history spanning thousands of years. It is known for its natural beauty, ancient temples and palaces, amazing wildlife, and for being one of the most important tea growing regions in the world. Due to its location and geography, it has been an important centre of world trade since the days of the ancient silk road, and remains so to this day. It has a diverse mix of cultures with influence from Buddhism, Hinduism, and British Colonialism.







TREBUCHET NEWS

Wednesday of Week 7 saw the culmination of the Eagle Group Trebuchet program. With the assistance of the Year 11 Modern History class, the group's two trebuchets fired against each other in competition in front of the entire school.

Trebuchets were a medieval siege engine. Built of wooden and metal beams and fastenings, trebuchets were often built on-site outside a castle or town that was being besieged. They would fling rock projectiles against the fortified walls, gradually hammering a breach through which the attackers could storm. Often

the mere presence of a trebuchet or two could be enough for the defenders to surrender, as they would be better treated if they agreed to honourable terms rather than put the attacking force to weeks of work.



Our trebuchets were not as big as some of the medieval monsters which have been described from those days, but the principles worked in the same way. They use gravity to release a stored weight on a counter arm. This flings a sling in which the projectile is encased.

We had two teams for our competition, led by students Zac Howe and Macinlay Maslin. The ceremonial opening shots were fired by two local VIPs: federal MP Luke Gosling OAM, and the NT's Tony Sievers MLA, Member for Brennan, the Assistant Minister for Veterans Affairs, Sports & Community Events.

Then the two teams fired five shots each, together, in a competition for range. They were evenly matched, though there were penalties for firing before the whistle, and a misfire. Then three shots were fired for accuracy, against two wheelie bins, one atop another. A direct hit was scored, with the two kilo water-filled milk carton projectile knocking the top bin off. Team Zac led the charge early, and fired the direct hit, but also misfired and scored zero for a shot, so Team Mac pipped them at the post. Both teams won chocolate prizes.

As an education outcome, the project was good value. It taught:

- Leadership, for both emerging and accomplished student leaders
- Teamwork for all
- Physics in a number of ways from lever principles to a study of stored kinetic energy
- Mathematics in calculating various angles in the building, plus understanding ratios of the weights involved, and
- History in developing an understanding of medieval times.

The groups involved would especially like to thank Mr Paul Dimmick, for his passion and knowledge; Ms Alix Stirling, for scoring and encouragement of the Eagle Group, and school officers Mr Roy Levers and Mr Ian Anderson. And Principal Graham, for backing an idea that let us combine education with FUN!



Please note the following:

- The National Assessment Program Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an annual national assessment for all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9
- NAPLAN provides governments, education leaders, schools, parents and students with information on how Australian students are performing in the essential areas of literacy and numeracy.
- In 2018 the first schools around the country successfully performed NAPLAN online.
- It is expected that all eligible schools across the country will be using NAPLAN Online by 2020.
- NAPLAN Online will allow better assessment through tailored testing, more precise
 data on our students, faster turnaround of results and more precise measurement.
- It has been confirmed that the NT will start its implementation of NAPLAN Online in May 2019.
- The transition to NAPLAN Online will involve about 40 schools with high bandwidth internet participating in the first stage of preparation activities, which includes school readiness training in August and testing in September 2018 for most schools.
- Our school will be part of this first group of schools transitioning to NAPLAN Online in
- We will participate in platform readiness testing in Term 4 to ensure the updated platform for 2019 meets the needs of Territory students.
- We want NAPLAN Online to be a positive experience for our students, teachers and school community.


