DRONE PROGRAMME

Eagle Group, in keeping with its motto of "Fly Higher!" is introducing a drone program across the year levels of the Gifted and Talented cohort.

Initial Use

All students are expected to initially qualify for drone use by demonstrating the following:

- take off inside from a table
- fly for a counted ten seconds
- land the drone on the same table
- take off within five seconds
- fly for a counted ten seconds
- land on a different table

Until you can complete the above you are restricted from further drone use

Your flight exam must be signed off by a teacher

Drone usage:

- Monday period 5
- Wednesday and Friday HF
- Each year group will have two drones allocated to it
 - Red drones years 7-8; white drones 9 and above
- Drones must be unpacked, used, and packed up within one minute of the bell
- Your group breaks it; you are down a drone until fixed
 - Drone mechanics will be assigned and will rotate on a regular basis. At present they are:
 - 7: Adetoro Adetokunbo; Massimo Gazzola,
 - 8: Will O'Donnell; Isabella Pena,
 - 9: Jonah Martin; Elizabeth Salter
 - 10-12: Jon Maxwell; Aleena Gleeson
 - Drone mechanics are to:
 - At the beginning of each session:
 - Collect drone boxes from the staffroom at 825 and 1215
 - First on list to collect; if absent second to collect - reverse on return
 - Install the battery, being careful to not force the connectors
 - At the end of each session:
 - Return boxes with all components according to the checklist
 - Remove the battery from the remote
 - Remove the battery from the drone
 - Replace propellers or propeller guards as necessary
- No-one in the group progresses to part 2 until ALL people in the group have passed – exercise your Teamwork and Leadership skills

Virtual Reality versions/First Person View headsets

Programme Overall - Where Can Drones Take Us?

- We anticipate using the drones in a variety of ways:
 - in an inter-house challenge
 - on Feast Day
 - for demonstrations
 - for fun
 - within subjects
- This program as outlined here can and will change as we explore possibilities.

How Can You Use The Drone In Your **Subjects?**

- Possible ideas:
 - Science how does a drone fly? How does it manoeuvre?
 - Maths what must a power to weight ratio be for a drone to fly?
 - SOSE if drones deliver books does that deprive someone of a job? Does that matter? What about pizzas?
 - Note: incorporating a drone into your school work outside the program as above is likely to be a matter of careful negotiation with the drone owners (Eagle Group), and your subject teacher.

















Aviation Training Programme

Students interested in Aviation, from the school's Gifted and Talented Group, recently attended the Launch of the new Aviation Training Program at the CareFlight Hangar, Darwin Airport Precinct.

This partnership between the Department of Education and Aviation Australia provides an opportunity for NT students to access a Certificate II in Aircraft Line Maintenance: a pathway into the aviation industry that has previously only been accessible interstate.



The MacKillop Catholic College Registered Training Organisation (RTO) Manager, Rachel Taylor, was invited as a guest speaker to present at the National Future Schools Expo and Conferences in Melbourne (20 March 2019) to highlight the innovation of integrating mainstream and Vocational Education and Training (VET) curriculum.

The key focus of the presentation was to highlight the growing role of VET and industry based training, discussing innovation and pilot programs integrating the two different curricula approaches and providing a case study in managing curricular integration in a secondary context (using MacKillop Catholic College as the exemplar).

Rachel highlighted the four different approaches to VET and mainstream curriculum integration and detailed the benefits of different approaches and how having a flexible VET delivery model best caters to individual students' needs, enables successful academic achievement for students and responds to the dynamic educational context of a busy secondary school.

Through the provision of inclusive' and 'tailored' training and assessment, utilizing scaffolded or integrated learning that blends mainstream and VET content, students are able to gain credit points towards high school completion certificate with reinforcement of the relevance of curriculum to the real world and employment pathways.

Saints Rue Missed Opportunities in The Opening Round of the Academy Cup

The victory went to the visiting team today as Taminmin College defeated the MacKillop Saints 20-16 at Saints Field in the first round of the inaugural Academy Cup competition.

Taminmin got off to a flying start in the first half of the proceedings with two quick tries down their left flank which really got MacKillop onto the back foot early. It seemed the Saints minds might still have been in the dressing sheds when the visitors went in for a third but a great backline finishing try to Saints player of the match, Darcy Nalder, saw the the team get points on the scoreboard before the halftime whistle sounded.

During the halftime break, coach Matthew Sharp reminded the boys that it was attitude that was letting them down in all aspects of play and that a commitment to doing the little things right and making the 1% plays would see the team play better in the second half. Fill in captain, Nathan Dixon, appealed to his team to come out in the second half with renewed enthusiasm and to have pride in their performance.

Dixon's words seemed to have effect as the Saints came back from the halftime break with a renewed spirit and looked ready to play.

A great solo effort from super-sub, Brody Reed, really helped

turn the tide of the match and when scores were levelled by another try to Darcy Nalder, it looked like MacKillop had all the momentum and might go on to take the lead. Speaking about the result today, Coach Sharp said -

'While it is always disappointing to lose in front of a home crowd in a cup tie, there are a lot of positives to take from the match. Taminmin are a great team headed by a really good rugby league coordinator and were always going to be a test for us. The way the team came back in the second half is a great representation of their character. Maybe on another day the missed opportunities get taken and this report sounds very different, but thats footy. Today was just one of those days'.

When questioned about who impressed with their play today, Sharp cited player of the match, Darcy Nalder, who he said he was really impressed with today, Mitchell Hausler, whose hard work in the off-season has seen his play and physicality improve greatly and also Crocs Harland, who saw time in the unfamiliar position of front row coming in from his usual position on the wing. Perhaps a positional change is ahead for the versatile, Harland.

Taminmin rugby league coordinator Dean White described the encounter as a game of two halves. He thanked the Saints for a tough opening match up and said that he looked forward to another meeting in the Eels Cup competition later next term.

Thanks this week must go to the great crowd that assembled at MacKillop Field today to support the team. It is always a thrill to perform in front of your home crowd. Thanks must also go to the sideline officials, Lachlan Charman and Izyiah Pairama for assisting with the officiating.

Attention now turns to next week when the Saints senior team faces Palmerston Senior College for the annual Palmerston Cup. See you at 4pm next Wednesday at MacKillop Field to see club captain, Jayden Hunter, lead the team for the first time this year.

Gutsy Second Half Comeback Sees the Saints Lift the Palmerston Cup for 2019

A spirited half time comeback from the MacKillop Saints Open Boys rugby league side against the visiting 2018 Palmerston Cup champions, Palmerston Senior College, saw the Saints take victory in an extremely close 2019 encounter.

Club captain Jayden Hunter led his Saints team into the match which was played in wet and boggy conditions after a significant downfall of rain this week.

The Saints had all the momentum in the opening sequences and enjoyed a lot of field position down on the PSC end of the pitch thanks to strong runs from prop, Ethan Gregory, who was well supported by the rest of his forward pack. Unfortunately for the Saints, this wealth of territorial advantage would not lead to points despite fullback, Stepheno George, crossing the try line only to be penalised for double movement by the referee. PSC then took full advantage of a swing in the momentum of the game and managed to score twice before the halftime siren, entering the break with a 10-0 lead.

In the middle of the halftime huddle, coach Matthew Sharp encouraged his players by telling them that despite what the scoreline indicated, he felt the Saints were on top of the contest and that communication and sticking to the game plan of playing central while attacking the ruck would see the side eat into the deficit before too long.

The message seemed to have effect as the Saints hit back first and early into the second half with a try to inspirational captain, Jayden Hunter. Hunter more closely resembled a rhinoceros on stampede as he ran 30 meters brushing off multiple defenders on his way to scoring adjacent the left upright. The try was converted by 5/8, Phil Vo, to take the game to 10-6. Saints managed to put the scorers to work again soon after thanks to a crafty sneak out of dummy half by hooker, Harry Price, late in the tackle count with PSC defending their line. Vo gave the Saints the lead with another conversion.

From here the game took a dramatic turn with a runaway try to PSC resulting from tired middle of the park defence from lay your journey always be filled with blessings and may the

MacKillop. PSC converted the try to extend their lead to four points.

MacKillop had to move fast with time running out in the half.

Strong scoots from dummy half by winger, Aidan Smith, and vice-captain, Jake Crawley, denting the line saw the Saints get back down into PSCs half. Stepheno George finished an impressive left edge play by running through the opposition defence before carrying the ball back in under the posts for Vo to have his easiest kick of the day, taking the team to a narrow 18-16 lead with 5 minutes left on the clock. George was involved in another classy play prior where he chased down a PSC back who made a break into the back field with a large head start and an open try line but George managed to tackle the player within inches of the try line. Geroge's try proved the match winner but his commitment to never giving up on a play to make the unlikely tackle proved to be the match saver as PSC would not bother the scorers again.

When asked for comment on the game today, Coach Sharp offered the following -

'I am really pleased for all our players today. We had a preparation interrupted by weather, injury, personal circumstances and squad members pulling out at the last minute which was disappointing but the character of the players who threw on the jersey today to go out there and win against a good opposition and tough odds, really shows what type of football club we have here at MacKillop. Winning silverware is always great but the biggest win for me was seeing some really great young men come together, work as a team, show belief in themselves and their mate next to them and prove to themselves that they had what it took to stand up succeed. Today was the toughest performance I've witnessed in my time coaching at MacKillop. It was a team performance where everybody contributed and one that I am most proud of. In fact, we played a lot of the match with only one player on the bench today'.

Sharp made special mention of halfback, Alister Lasker, who showed incredible courage to step up not one but two age groups in competition and compete with vigour, well above his weight. 'I gave him a job to do out there' Sharp said, "deliver the ball out to our edges and try to avoid traffic in the defensive line. I'm proud to say he exceeded those basic instructions and even put some strong shots on in defence against players twice his size. Alister might be the youngest player to ever represent the Saints in the Opens division'.

Sharp also made a point of highlighting the defence of Ronan Kordjan, who forced the opposition into errors on more than one occasion and also Josh Bates who played tough today and is an early Most Improved candidate for this season.

Thanks must go to all involved in a great team effort today - from our groundsman, Shane Hutchinson, who prepared a top class pitch for us to use, to the water team led by the two Matts who kept the team hydrated, to super-sub, Chase Dawes, who we can always trust to be a reliable player off the bench and to Palmerston Council for sponsoring the Cup initiative.

Thanks must also go to Federal Member - Hon. Mr. Luke Gosling for making himself available to watch the match this afternoon and present the team with the cup.

Goanna Park Adventure Camp is a unique experience offered by Variety NT with its core mission being to challenge teenagers with mild physical or mental disabilities to overcome barriers with an aim to increase self esteem and confidence.

This is achieved through a busy week-long calendar of activities, but also time spent together to develop friendships and express themselves in a safe and very supporting environment. The camp is being held at the Goanna Park Junior Police Rangers Youth facility 90km east of Darwin on the Arnhem Highway.

Admission is open to <u>special needs children all around Australia between the ages of 13-17years old</u> and it is a truly fantastic experience highlighting what the NT has to offer. Once at the camp, the children start the process of settling in and for many this is their first time away from the comforts, routines and limitations of their family life.

The wonderful Variety volunteers soon get them involved in lots of fun activities and doing things they would never have thought they could achieve before arrival.

The camp is operated by experienced organisers and carers and there is a registered nurse on site at all times. The children's safety is paramount at all times.

As the camp is held in the NT's dry season the weather is cooler for camping out. The children sleep in supervised screen tents on a large grassed area.

A variety of indoor and outdoor Territorian activities are provided to keep the children busy from sunrise until sundown and include abseiling, swimming, craft activities and visiting many of the local attractions.

Towards the end of the camp a special talent quest showcases the children's increased confidence. The children unite during the week to practice skits, songs and comedy acts and then present them onstage to much applause.

The positive effects of the camp are far reaching and help nurture determination and resilience when facing life's obstacles, with the children knowing they have accomplished much already and now have a great bunch of friends with which to share their future laurney.
