United in Talent

The Arts (Performing and Visual) are an important part of the education community at MacKillop. Each year hundreds of students take part in our major events that celebrate and showcase the huge variety and quality of talent in students at MacKillop and our feeder primary schools.

The events managed by our Arts department in any one year include:

- Music, Dance and Drama Evenings each Semester
- L'Esprit Des Cordes
- MacKillop's Got Talent
- Young Musician of the Year
- Biennial College Musical
- Artist in Residence and Student Visual Art Exhibitions

The main objectives of these events are to:

- Encourage the development of excellence in performance in all students; and,
- Provide opportunities for students to participate in performances at the highest level.

As the year rolls on we begin our preparations for our 2020 Musical, **WICKED**. Excitement is growing with the audition dates drawing closer.

Students can take part in this event which incorporates performances by musicians, choristers, dancers and actors as well as backstage crew, lighting and sound technicians, costume and set designers, and many more.

And lastly, why have musicals:

"Musical theatre is difficult to define and compartmentalise. Looking at its individual components—I think it's fair to say that music can significantly enhance a moment onstage in a way that cannot be duplicated. It can incredibly dramatise a moment or provide complete contextual comedy to another moment. When put to lyrics, music has the ability to be entirely transporting—in a singular way—which a non-musical play cannot. Music is, after all, a universal language".

"Dance, as an art form, and a means of expression is similarly intangible but, when used to capture a feeling or a dramatic moment, stands alone in its ability to convey expression or evoke emotion. And while the spoken work is, and of itself is, theatre (drama or comedy), without the accompanying underscore and movement, a musical is not made".

"Each component must be recognized as having power and content. When combined with one another like parts of a baking recipe, the delicate blend ideally is defining and transporting".

"Successful musical theatre is a combination of craft, sensitivity, balance, nuance and rigor. Understanding the balance of each component and how they work together to create investment in both story and characters is a terrific skill. I think the question is not so much 'What makes a great musical?' as 'Who makes a great musical?' It is a craft and its required skill is not to be underestimated."

Speaking of the future of the art form, Smock wrote:

"The form of the modern musical is ever evolving. As the art form progresses and new writers, voices and artists emerge to create and reinterpret this distinct form, I believe we have much to learn and witness about the elusive but powerful experience of the 'musical'. After all, theatre is an evolution and therefore, so is its musical sibling."

International Film Competition

In Semester 1, 2019, Students undertaking the Certificate II in Creative Industries (CUA20215) entered an international film competition to highlight their learnings in digital screen and media. 'Ability at MacKillop' depicts a journey through the day-to-day philosophy underlying the Inclusion Support team at MacKillop Catholic College.

The short film provides a glimpse of the trials and triumphs of being wheelchair bound as an analogy to rising above the many challenges in a contemporary high school setting. A twist at the end of this film makes this a thought provoking story about how to 'focus on ability' and to challenge people's fixed beliefs about people living with individual challenges. Semester 1 VET Courses

In Semester 1, 13 students completed qualifications in Business and in Conservation and Land Management with the MacKillop RTO. Students gained nationally recognised qualifications and added points to their NTCET patterns. Congratulations to all of our students.

2019 MacKillop RTO Partnership Programs

Certificate I Conservation and Land Management students undertook a work experience day with Bunnings Warehouse Palmerston. Students in years 9-12 experienced what it was like to work within a commercial nursery, learning the importance of work health and safety in the nursery, cleaning and maintaining the nursery tools and equipment, including checking under the plant shelves for any extra wildlife. Students learnt the value of presentation of plants, how to restock and identify the correct area for placement of species and practised their manual handling techniques and team work.

In Semester 2, students will continue studying conservation and land management by undertaking a work based program with the George Brown botanical Gardens. As well as obtaining units of competency in Business to enhance communication and work health and safety in the workplace, students will further their knowledge of operating machinery by undertaking weed identification and eradication at the Botanical Gardens. Students will gain the (AHCMOM203) Operate basic machinery and equipment* unit of competency through the participation in the work placement.

*AHCMOM203 Unit of competency will be delivered and assessed by an external RTO – Train Safe NT 70038

A specialist photography elective is being run in conjunction with the Arts Department to offer students an extension in digital imaging and graphic manipulation techniques. This program will run like a normal elective and will contribute points towards the NTCET as well as accrediting students with 3 nationally recognised units of competency.

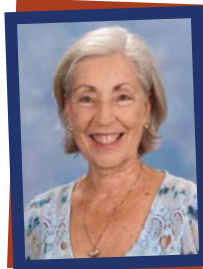

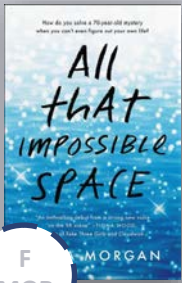

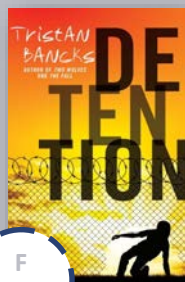

When they make their escape, a guard raises the alarm. Shouting, smoke bombs, people tackled to the ground. In the chaos Sima loses her parents.

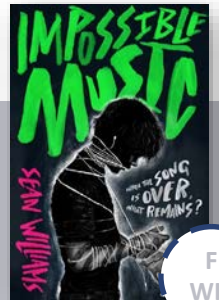
Dad told her to run, so she does, hiding in a school and triggering a lockdown. A boy,

Dan, finds her hiding in the toilet block. What should he do? Help her? Dob her in? She's breaking the law, but is it right to lock kids up? And if he helps, should Sima trust him? Or run?

This moment, these decisions, will change the course of their lives.

Music is Simon's life - which is why he is devastated when a mini-stroke obliterates his hearing. He resists attempts to help him adjust to his new state, refusing to be counselled, learn sign language, or have anything to do with Deaf culture. Refusing, that is, until he meets G, a tough-as-nails girl dealing with her own newly experienced hearing loss.

In an emotionally compelling tale crackling with originality, Simon's quest to create an entirely new form of music forces him into a deeper understanding of his relationship to the hearing world, of himself, and of the girl he meets along the way.
