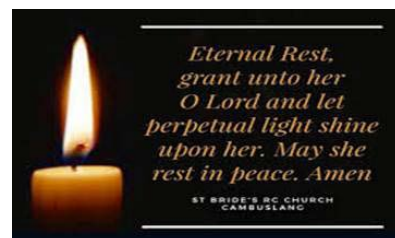
May Bernadette's noble and generous soul rest in peace.

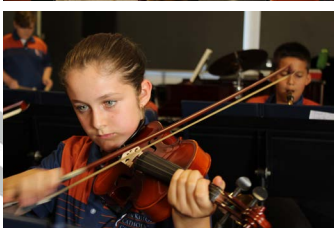

Good evening,

Many thanks for the opportunity to present the MacKillop Catholic College Parents and Friends Association 2020 Report to this Board meeting.

I would like to begin this report by reflecting on the primary focus of the P&F Association during 2019 and 2020. As you would be aware, the P&F has been a strong advocate for a Family Engagement focus to be included as a major component of the College ethos. This focus acknowledges the importance of family in the success of our students and recognizes the diversity of family structures within our community. One of the initiatives you may have noticed is that correspondence sent from the College is now addressed, 'Dear Families', as opposed to 'Dear Parents/Guardians'. In doing this we are recognizing that all family structures are of equal importance. We have also been successful in creating identification badges for family members coming to the College who we consider not as visitors, but as valued members of our College community. These 'Family' badges will assist in engendering a sense of belonging among our families. With the assistance of Oren Tyler, a Staff Identification poster has been created to allow families to more readily identify members of staff when meeting with them at the College. The posters have been placed in the Reception areas of the College and will be posted on our website and social media sites. A recent valuable outcome of the Family Engagement initiative has been the much needed increase in Counselling services from 3 to 4 days per week. The P&F Committee will continue its Family Engagement focus into the future.

Our end of year fundraising activity for 2019 was a Trivia Evening. This was a fun filled night with people generously donating prizes, enthusiastically bidding on auction items and challenging the Quiz Master's decision in the quest for those elusive winning points. By asking people to donate a non-perishable food item on the evening we were able to supplement the Colleges' Vinnies Christmas food hamper. Unfortunately, due to the ongoing COVID-19 restrictions, we have been unable to pursue any fundraising activities since March. A decision was also taken by the P&F to not hold any fundraising activities for the remainder of the year in acknowledgement of the financial difficulties many members of our College and the wider community are experiencing. However, this does not mean that we are doing nothing. Later this term we will be running a Middle Years Disco and we have plans to support the donation of prepared food items to local food distribution charities. Once again this year we will be continuing our tradition of providing lollies to the children attending the Christmas Eve Children's Mass at Our Lady Help of Christians church. This activity is always a hit with big smiles being reward enough.

It is once again our privilege to donate sashes to our graduating Indigenous students. This is the third year the P&F have supported our Indigenous students in recognizing their tremendous efforts in achieving such wonderful success in their studies. We are proud to be given the opportunity to contribute in this small way.

Over the past few years our fundraising endeavours have been in support of erecting a shade structure over the seating on the front basketball court. We are pleased to announce that we are currently in the process of obtaining quotes and feel confident that the construction project is drawing near.

The P&F Committee would like to thank the MacKillop Catholic College Board for its support during the past year. We are grateful for the positive relationship we have maintained and appreciate the guidance

offered. We have found our working relationship to have been of enormous benefit to the College community.

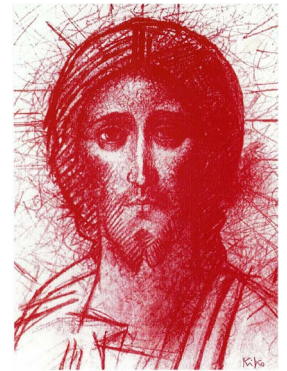

Continuous Reporting

Dear Families,

It is with great pleasure and excitement I write to our wonderful families to launch a new reporting system for MacKillop Catholic College – Continuous Reporting.

For some time now I have been talking about this new way of reporting and giving both students and families feedback on student progress. You will no longer need to wait till the end of semester to see

your child's grades and receive written feedback. With Continuous Reporting and using the SEQTA Learn (Students) and SEQTA Engage (Parents) platforms you will be able to see your child's results and receive written feedback from the teacher on each individual assessment task. This will give students a chance to implement this academic feedback in their next assessment.

In line with this the College will be launching reviewed and updated Assessment and Reporting Policies. Once these have been ratified, copies will be sent home and posted on the College website.

While some faculties have been reporting like this for some time now, we are in a position where families can expect that at least one assessment task from each of their child's core subject teachers (Religious Education, Mathematics, English, SOSE, Science and HPE) to be reported on by using continuous reporting in Term 4. Remember, this grade and comment will be specific to the assessment task undertaken by your child.

Further to this Continuous Reporting, at the end of Semester you will still receive a written report with your child's overall grades for the year in each subject including electives with a tick a box for the learning attributes of your child, similar to the report received at the end of Semester One. Homeform teachers will also include a written comment within this report.

As stated, above SEQTA Engage is the parent platform used for this and a number of other very useful purposes. As such the College will be running a parent SEQTA Engage session on Monday 26 October 2020 commencing 5.30pm. The venue for this will be the Father Gerry Remie Centre (Library).

The objective of the session will be to feature SEQTA Engage and to provide parents with the opportunity to familiarise themselves with the features of the portal. Please bring your mobile device (phone/tablet/ipad) with internet access, for a hands-on experience of SEQTA Engage.

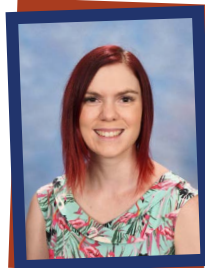

Mobile Phone Policy

Dear Families,

Mobile phones have many advantages and much potential to be used positively in educational settings. Unfortunately the technology has far outrun the ability of many of our children to use these items only in a positive manner. While this has been an increasing issue for schools over the past few years, causing some Australian states to make it illegal for students to have phones at school, this issue has been

further exacerbated by the coronavirus and the consequent increase in screen time for children.

We have seen the effects of this at MacKillop with issues begun after school hours, spilling over into school time and pre-occupying far too much staff time trying to rebuild relationships damaged by young minds unaware of the power they are wielding and the damage this is doing to their classmates.

Consequently, in line with our Personal Electronic Technology Policy which stipulates that it is unacceptable for Mobile Phones to be switched on or used during the school day, we have introduced Locked Mobile Phone Boxes for all students in Years 7, 8 & 9. Students in these year levels are required to put their phones into these boxes each morning in Homeform and collect them from Homeform Teachers at their Homeform Rooms at the end of each day. Those students on the Early Bus List have their phones placed in a special box kept at Student Reception and their phones are distributed by staff on Early Bus Duty. Students who have their phones out during the day will have them confiscated and parents will be required to collect the phones from Student Reception.

We introduced these changes to Year 7 on Monday, Year 9 on Tuesday and Year 8s will follow suit on Friday. Already we are seeing the benefits among younger students with less classroom disruption and fewer incidents of cyber "gossip" fuelling issues between students. We are hoping that with your continued support we can help our younger students navigate safely through this difficult stage of their lives.

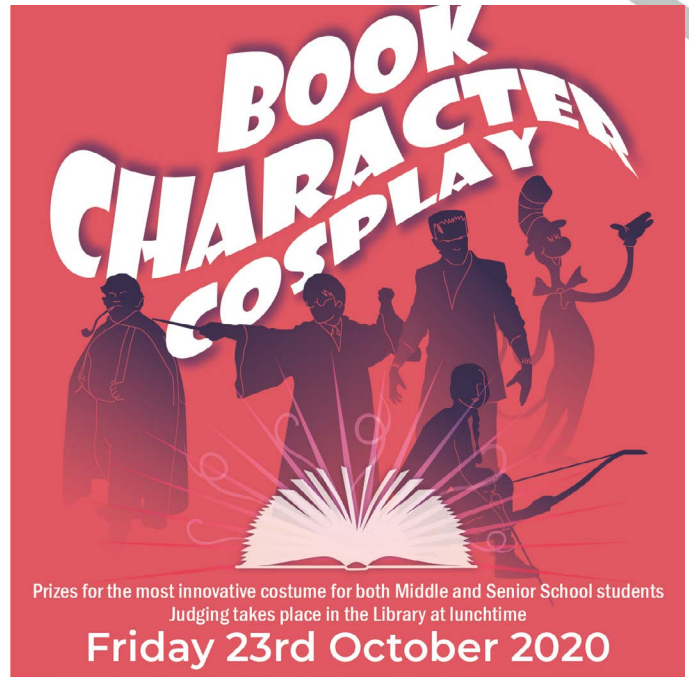

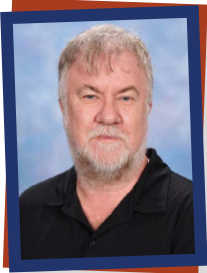

Dear Parents and Students,

In 2021 MCC is offering to selected year 9 students the possibility of combining their usual SOSE subject with a Modern History Stage 1 subject, which students usually attempt in Year 11. Such a program would give students early credit towards their senior certificate.

Year 9 SOSE sees students study the Industrial Revolution, World War I, and colonial Australia. The 2021 approach would combine these with the study of British Imperialism and the concept of Revolution – in this case that of the American Civil War.

The MCC approach to these two areas uses an exciting combination of wargaming, historical movies, hand-on item examination – for example we bring edged and firearm weapons in to study – and excursions to places such as the Darwin Military Museum, and the NT Aviation Museum.

We have used this approach successfully in the past. For example, Massimo Gazzola (right) undertook Modern History Stage 1 in 2019, while in year 7, and gained an A achievement. He is studying the Year 12 Stage 2 this year. Congratulations Massimo!



This approach next year is only being offered to the following:

- Year 9 (in 2021) students of the Gifted and Talented program, in keeping with the Group motto of "Fly Higher", and
- Year 9 (in 2021) students who achieved an A or B in Year 8 SOSE this year, and
- Any other student the SOSE HOD considers worthy.

The assessment load is similar to year 9. There are four assessment items over each semester, although the item length is longer. The assignments are a mix of practical – such as making an item, or participating in a wargame – and theoretical, such as investigating a famous historical figure, for example Queen Victoria.

After consultation between student and parent(s), if students are interested in participating in such a class during the normal SOSE timetabled classes of 2021, please ask your parent to email me directly on tom.lewis@nt.catholic.edu.au. Of course, if you have further questions on this subject, please also feel free to ask.

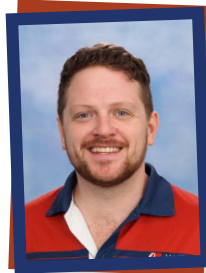

Mackillop dominate to win the College's first Eels Cup

After many attempts, the MacKillop Saints finally tasted victory at TRL Stadium, defeating SEDA College to win their first Eels Cup.

The Saints first team, capably led by captains Noah Pinheiro and Player of the Tournament, Liam 'Justin' Kennedy, opened their day facing the highly fancied Taminmin 1sts. Despite a close final score line, the Saints rarely looked challenged against their long-term local rivals, as three unanswered tries saw the Saints lead 12-0 early. A spirited Taminmin comeback bridged the gap somewhat but it wasn't enough to stop the Saints, wearing the ochre strip, with the final score reading 16-12.



The Saints' second game of the tournament was against SEDA College, who would later be met in the competition final. SEDA presented a significant defensive challenge to the young Saints team with damaging ball runners on both flanks of the field. MacKillop opened the scoring with two early tries and then sealed the victory with a later try to win 18-6. This win meant that MacKillop finished the round games undefeated, atop of the Pool 1 table.

Taminmin 2 were the next challenge for MacKillop 1 in an elimination preliminary final. Coach Matthew Sharp turned to his bench for this match and gave extra minutes to impact players like Josh Hanslow and Shane Bracken who stamped their claims for a starting position in the grand final. MacKillop won this match in a 28-0 boilover of the opposition setting the team up for a Pool 1 rematch against SEDA for the title after they defeated Palmerston College in the other preliminary match up.

The grand final rematch began in the right tempo for the Saints with a lot of territory gained in the opening sets thanks to strong runs from the likes of Konnar Black, Liam Kennedy and Dylan Mugadza. Noah Pinheiro set the tone in defence and limited opportunities for SEDA to make meaningful gains into attacking territory. This allowed playmakers Beau Ryan, Izaiah Waters and arguably player of the pool rounds, Brandon Norris to capitalise on the earned advantage and turn it into points on the scoreboard. When the fulltime horn sounded, MacKillop were declared victorious with a 24-4 win.

MacKillop's second boys team dressed in the Indigenous strip for their tournament. Although they weren't able to register a win on this occasion, each player conducted themselves with spirit, courage and determination. Standout players included Nkosolathi Sibanda who stepped just about all of Taminmin 2 to score his maiden try in spectacular fashion, and Talan Krout who was a rock in the centre of

the field.

The girls team experienced some success beating Taminmin 2 in the pool rounds. As usual, Ana Malupo established herself as a dominant player early and was supported by the likes of Sophie Berry and Piper Heath who were also mentioned in positive tones. Congratulations to club debutants Hannah Burgoyne, Marley Morgan, Erica Mow, Paige McCourt, Aaliyah Nichols and Piper Heath for becoming involved with the program. The girls team is a young one, and expected to improve to a point of contending for the title next season.



Now that the Eels Cup has finished for 2020, we close the book on another successful chapter of Saints Rugby League. Thanks to all involved in this disrupted season. Highlights to look forward to for next year include an Open Boys tour to Townsville to compete in a Reconciliation Cup Gala Day, a visiting girls tour from Wilsonton State High School, Toowoomba, and the defence of the u16s Eels Cup for 2021.

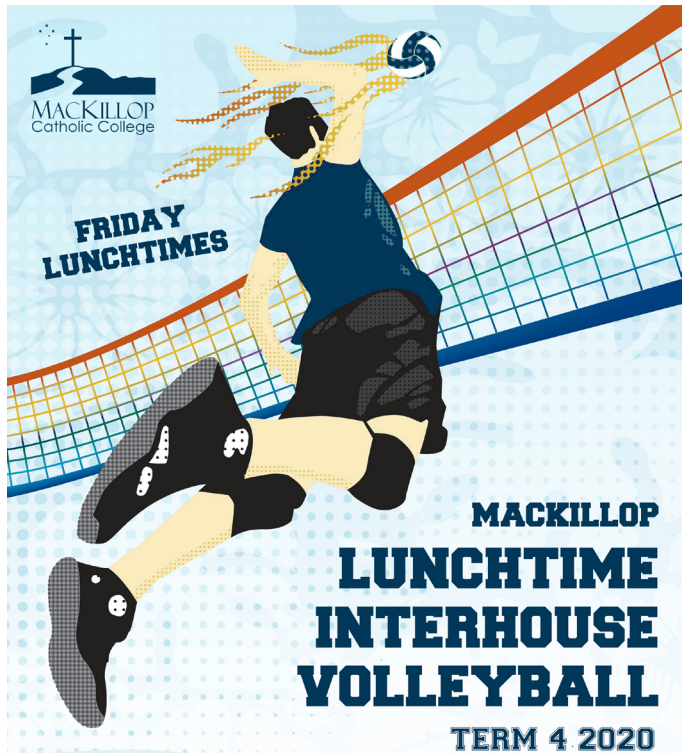
