Dear Families of MacKillop Catholic College,

I, unfortunately, am not one of those people. People seem to expect that you have these deep and meaningful words of wisdom to share, when in reality, I am just an ordinary person going about my job. When those eloquent words won't come, it is often just best to share what you are thinking.

Last night I played the part of an interested spectator when attending the Year 10, 11 and 12 Parent and Student SACE Information Night. The evening left me

impressed on so many levels.

I was impressed, first of all, by the numbers present for the evening. Apart from a few empty seats right in the front couple of rows (and you wonder where the kids get it from!), it literally was standing room only in the Library – and it is a big Library. The interest shown by the parents and students was both heartening and encouraging.

I was impressed by the number of staff present last night – not surprised, but impressed. I have been here long enough now to realise how passionate and dedicated are our staff. I am witness on a daily basis to how caring and compassionate they are. Are we perfect – no. But I have been witness to the tears and frustrations following the behaviours of some of our younger students who have no idea how privileged they are to be able to access a quality education.

I have seen already the encouragement and concern he shows to each individual.

I was impressed when Ms Patricia Sweeney-Fawcett spoke on the options available through the RTO, VET and Flexible Learning. It really did bring home to me the amazingly broad spectrum of opportunities available to our students. Again, it emphasised to me the efforts of the College to meet the needs of each individual student.

I was impressed by the presentation of Mrs Wallis, the College's Well Being / Liaison / Child Protection Officer. Again, the interest was on the well being of the individuals under our care. I think my impression was how fortunate we are to have such a caring and compassionate person in such a caring role available to each of us within our community.

And the night went on, but sadly I have used up my allocated word limit.

It is easy for us to get caught up in the negativity in the world around us. But sometimes, we just simply miss the forest for the trees. There is much to celebrate.

BOMBING OF DARWIN COMMEMORATION

MacKillop was represented last week at the Bombing of Darwin Commemoration by our four school captains: Idelle Bolwell, Elijah Bamford-Brice, Cameron Dickman and Blaise Pereira. The ABC interviewed Idelle and Blaise, along with Dr Tom Lewis, who as well as a staff member is a well-known military historian. Afterwards they all enjoyed a morning tea in Parliament House, where the students were able to view the remains of the Post Office, represented by a wall and a plaque where the PO took a direct hit on 19 February 1942. All up it was both an educational and an interesting first duty for our new captains for 2021.

Dr Tom Lewis OAM Modern History Teacher

Weapons Through the Ages

Year 9 Modern History students, who are attempting a course usually taken on by year 11 students, recently had a hands-on experience with centuries of weapons of war, courtesy of the Arms Collector' Association of the NT.

Four of their people - thanks Jared, Tony, Craig and Anne - joined teacher Dr Tom Lewis in covering almost 1000 years of technology in 1.5 hours. Students

progressed through each table of artefacts in chronological order in groups of five.

The History pupils began with bows and swords, and armour of the Crusaders, and progressed through pole-axes and plate armour to the age of gunpowder. There they handled muzzleloading firearms and moved on to breechloading single-shot muskets and rifles. The age of magazine-fed weapons such as the famous Lee-Enfield 303, used by Commonwealth troops in World War I, was joined by artillery ammunition and a selection of uniforms.

Teacher Dr Lewis said that he liked to motivate the students through their curiosity early in the course. "If they find themselves fascinated through handing real equipment," he said, "then they also find theory components interesting too."

To take advantage of the presentation, students from Ms Mae Campbell-Emery's Year 8 SOSE also joined Dr Lewis's own Year 8s later in the day. They too examined the items on display over a double lesson.

At the end of the day the most popular item was a 15th century bascinet helmet, which students could try on, and a 18th century blunderbuss. MCC extends sincere thanks to ACANT for a great learning opportunity.

The MacKillop Saints u14s Rugby Union team delivered their best performance of the season last week narrowly going down to the University Pirates by a lone conversion in a game that ended 38-36. Captain Koen Hughes scored a hattrick of tries while Nathaniel Brown and Player of the Match, Nate Jarrett-Wright also kept the scorers busy.

It was an important result for the team and for its players who are mostly in the infancy

of their Union careers. The team will look to take this positive momentum into the final two rounds of the regular season against the Cougars and Swampdogs.

On a League front now, an expanded Eels Cup / Meg Ward Cup schedule has been announced for the 25th and 26th of March

for Boys and Girls respectively. In addition to the usual u16s competitions, an Opens division has been created as well as an u14s division in the girls competition. MacKillop will be entering teams in all division.




