

History and Location



The College is bounded to the east by the Sixteen Mile Camp – a site of military and cultural significance. On the western side of the College is situated a site which is of significance to local Indigenous people. MacKillop Catholic College is bound on its southern side by Lambrick Avenue and the College playing fields, and on the north by Northern Territory conservation land.

The first construction stage of MacKillop Catholic College was completed in 2012. Stage 2 development works commenced in 2014 and were completed in 2015. Stage 3 and 4 were completed in 2016.

- PLACE AND PEOPLE


In the years since, MacKillop Catholic College has progressively established itself within its environment; creating historical, cultural, geographic, social, and economic connections. Students appreciate that they are part of a bigger story, and that they are not the first people to visit this place. Through connecting with place and people MacKillop Catholic College students will learn what it is to have courage, endurance, teamwork, leadership, relationships, respect and many others.

Though it is early days for the College, students are already aware of the significance of the 16 Mile Camp. There are many lessons that can be drawn from the camp and its history. For example, the College motto 'Lead with Courage' echoes the sentiments of the soldiers who occupied the camp during World War II. After studying events connected to the camp, it is hoped that MacKillop students will have a deeper understanding of what it takes to overcome adversity, the need to stick together and (sometimes) make a stand regardless of the consequences. This links beautifully with "Never see a need without doing something about it" (Mary MacKillop, 1867). We hope that this understanding and appreciation will also lead to students actively working to protect the site for future generations.







The College was founded by lay people, based on a Charism of discipleship where outreach and service to the disadvantaged and marginalised is a cornerstone.



Above all at MacKillop, we endeavour to give more time than we normally think we can afford to the mechanics of our spiritual life. It is about taking time out of our normal routine (or as we go about our busy work) to listen and attend with the ear of our hearts (St Benedict) and make a special effort to listen with care and compassion to each person we meet; a gift given in a moment of meeting where a person's true nature and worth is acknowledged. In the text *Bread of Tomorrow*, Janet Morley points out that the service that is asked of us, the active engagement of our hands, feet or voices, is not understood only as a one-way gift. We believe in her words when she says: "one of the hardest assumptions for western society to relinquish is the view of ourselves as privileged and generous givers". There is much wisdom we desperately need to receive from those who are in a better position than we are to see the world accurately, if only we could acknowledge this as Mary MacKillop.

MacKillop Catholic College was officially opened in 2012, however, due to the implications caused by COVID-19, the College was not able to properly celebrate the significant milestone of its 10th anniversary in 2021.

MacKillop has grown from approximately 70 students to over 750, as indicated on the 2021 August census. In less than a decade, the College has become a preferred educational provider within Palmerston and the surrounding rural and semi-rural regions. From the Board's perspective, this success is underpinned by, and is a result of, the implementation of the core Vision and Values of the College.

From the Deputy Principal -Pastoral Care

PASTORAL CARE IN 2021

Pastoral Care at MacKillop Catholic College promotes the social, emotional and spiritual growth of our students. There are three major components; a Pastoral Care Team providing daily care for students in the school setting, a Pastoral Care Program intended to equip students with useful information and skills for their social and emotional development, and a Retreats and Camps Program focused on promoting the spiritual and social growth of students in out-of-normal-school environments. Relationship issues that arise are resolved based on Restorative Justice, a relational approach focusing on repairing harm and strengthening relationships. Reconciliation and mediation require contrition and a positive and sincere commitment by the parties involved to identify and address the harms, needs and responsibilities involved so that situations and relationships can be healed as much as possible.

The College day commences with Homeform and this daily interaction between students and their Homeform Teacher is the first element of the care provided by the Pastoral Care Team. This daily contact develops the relationship between the Homeform Teacher and their students. Homeform Teachers are also notified by other staff of relevant issues affecting their students and seek to make regular contact with parents to keep them informed of their child's progress. Homeform Teachers work with their year level Pastoral Care Coordinator to ensure that issues affecting students that arise within the year level are dealt with in a timely and age-appropriate manner. Pastoral Care Coordinators also seek regular contact with families to ensure all parties are working with the common goal of providing for the social and emotional development of the student. In a similar way Pastoral Care Coordinators work with the Deputy Principal – Pastoral Care.

This was a challenging year for our Pastoral Care Team with many features of our programs put aside to combat COVID-19. This meant missed Camps and Retreats and PC teams looking for other ways to fulfil our programs.





Reconciliation Action Plan in 2021

MacKillop Catholic College joins with our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander brothers and sisters to ensure greater understanding of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures within Australia. Our vision is for reconciliation to be achieved at MacKillop Catholic College by showing respect to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, their Land, cultures, spirituality and traditions.

We are committed to ensuring that community participation is strong and vibrant and that care and compassion is demonstrated through all activities and engagement with Aboriginal and Islander ways of knowing and being. We are a community of learning where each individual student is cared for and valued, and the wider community is enriched by the presence of our College. The formation of the school Reconciliation Action Plan in 2020 is one step we have taken in fulfilment of that commitment. Ever since the RAP has been a working document engaged with by many members of the school community, including the school Principal continuously.

Since its formation in 2020, the RAP working party and committee have actioned such deliverables as:

- Yearly sash presentations for ATSI graduates and their families, which serves to build strong community
 connections and acknowledges the achievements of graduates, making them feel cared for and valued.
- Whole school staff and student learning opportunities in the form of staff professional development and pastoral care lessons, building cultural knowledge and awareness at all levels of our school community.
- A wide range of guest presenters and workshops in areas such as sport, the arts, health, science and pastoral care, which build respect for ATSI ways of knowing and being in both Indigenous and non-Indigenous students, and further builds our relationships with Indigenous communities.
- Embedding Indigenous perspectives across curriculum areas; for example: the use of Indigenous authored and focused texts in English, a unit on indigenous games in HPE, explicit teaching of the truth of colonial Australia in History, exploring indigenous relation to country in Geography and many more.

Perhaps most proudly, in 2022 MacKillop Catholic College is able to offer to its year 10 students a dedicated three lesson a week Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies elective under the humanities faculty, and a community connections AboriginalStudies middles years elective, the planning and development of which occured in 2021.

These steps clearly demonstrate our commitment to ensuring all students are enriched with a strong and genuine respect for our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander brothers and sisters as they prepare to take their place in society and Lead with Courage, continuing the work and emulating the values of our namesake and Australia's first Saint, Saint Mary of the Cross MacKillop.

TEACHING AND LEARNING 2021

Again COVID-19 somewhat soured some of our usually fantastic events such as the Welcome Dinner for our Year 7 families in Term 1. However, the Water Project in Term 3 was able to be held and wow what a comeback. The work done by our students was absolutely wonderful. Many thanks to the staff involved and in particular Mr Musulin for leading the project.

One of the positives to come out of COVID was the College needed to accelerate the introduction of our Learning Management System - SEQTA, staff very quickly needed to become operational in using the platform to mark the roll, plan units of work, deliver lessons, set up a marks book and towards the end of year reporting in "Real Time'. This all continued in 2021 with the addition of paperless reporting at the end of the year. We continue to offer programs that enhance the learning journey of our students such as Literacy and Numeracy intervention for our Year 7 and 8 students, and support for our EALD students. Flexible Learning has done an excellent job with increasing the number of students involved in VET and school-based apprenticeships. Our RTO continues to grow offering a Certificate I Business as well as Certificates in Creative Industries, Information Digital Media & Technology, Conservation Land Management, all of which were re-written in line with ASQA regulations. The number of students taking on these opportunities is increasing as is student success rates with 100% of students completing course offered by our RTO.








2021 VET Delivered to Secondary Students (VDSS)




Number of students who have obtained School Based Apprenticeship/ Traineeship or Cadetship in 2021 and continuing in 2022



At MacKillop Catholic College, we are committed to improving workplace health and safety for its employees and students.

I began as the Work Health and Safety (WHS) Officer at MacKillop in Term 2 of 2021 and set about addressing areas of health and safety that required improvement or review. These areas included, staff inductions and training, student excursion safety plans, thorough accident/incident & injury reports and of course, COVID 19 safety management plans.

WHS Inductions & Training forms part of MacKillop Catholic College's legislative requirements to provide both general and site-specific WHS information and training to all existing and new members of staff. The new staff inductions and online training modules promote the values of a safety culture and provide information required for staff to understand Catholic Education Northern Territory (CENT) and MacKillop Catholic College's WHS Management system, guidelines, policies, and procedures.

In 2021, we continued to ensure that COVID-19 risks to the College had been fully assessed and that all control measures were suitable and sufficient, and the College is always in full compliance with the latest Chief Health Officer and government guidelines/advice. These control measures together with venue Statements of Commitment were introduced into all excursion risk assessments.

The accident/incident report forms were updated to better reflect conditions at the College and now forms the basis for better recommended corrective action review, action taken to minimise accident/incident reoccurrence and aids in clearer data collection for performance indicator reporting.
